The Hinckley Former Student Shares Ground-Breaking Work



The Hinckley Sixth Form recently welcomed back a distinguished alumni, Dr. Iain Detrey, who is making waves in the field of environmental conservation. Dr. Detrey, now serving as the National Peat Advisor for the Environment Agency, shared insights from his ground-breaking work on peatland in the Shetland Islands.

Having been an active participant in numerous science enrichment programs during his time at The Hinckley Sixth Form, Iain's journey has been nothing short of inspiring. After graduating, he pursued his passion for biology, eventually delving into the intricate world of peatland research.

His most recent project, intriguingly titled "Bog in a Box: Is Long-Term Peat Storage for Future Restoration Viable?", aims to address crucial questions surrounding sustainable peatland management. Dr. Detrey's expertise is not only rooted in academic pursuits, but also enriched by practical experience gained during his tenure with the IUCN UK Peatland Programme.

During his visit, Dr. Detrey captivated students with tales from the field and insights into the importance of preserving peatlands for future generations. His journey from The Hinckley Sixth Form to leading national initiatives demonstrates the school's commitment to nurturing scientific curiosity and fostering environmental stewardship among its students.

As Dr. Detrey continues to make strides in the field, his visit serves as a reminder to current students that with dedication and passion, they too can make a lasting impact on the world around them.




Year 11 Praised Following MFL Speaking Exams

Our Year 11 MFL students have completed their Speaking Exams (GCSE Spanish and French) this week. Ms Garcia said, "They've been preparing both at home and in school for three weeks and have worked relentlessly. During the Speaking, they are recorded and interviewed in the target language: they need to perform a role-play, describe a photo and answer up to 20 questions in their chosen language. This can be daunting, but I'm very proud of them."

Students got creative with revision strategies in the run up to their exams, for example last week they even used Jenga towers alongside the revision cards they created for themselves. For every correctly answered question (without hesitation), they were allowed to move one piece - and enjoyed biscuits! Well done on your hard work, creativity and dedication Year 11!

Robot Club - Ant-Weight Robots



Students in our 'Robot Club' have spent the last sixth months designing small robot battle bots, known as ant-weight robots.

After designing their robots and producing them using a 3D printer, students then added the electronics and motors to bring them to life, and have spent several weeks testing out their designs. The group are now taking part in a series of robot battles in the style of the television show 'Robot Wars' in which they have two minutes to defeat their opponents by disabling them or pushing them out of the arena. It is hoped that some of the students will be able to represent the school in a regional robot wars battle planned for later in the summer term.
